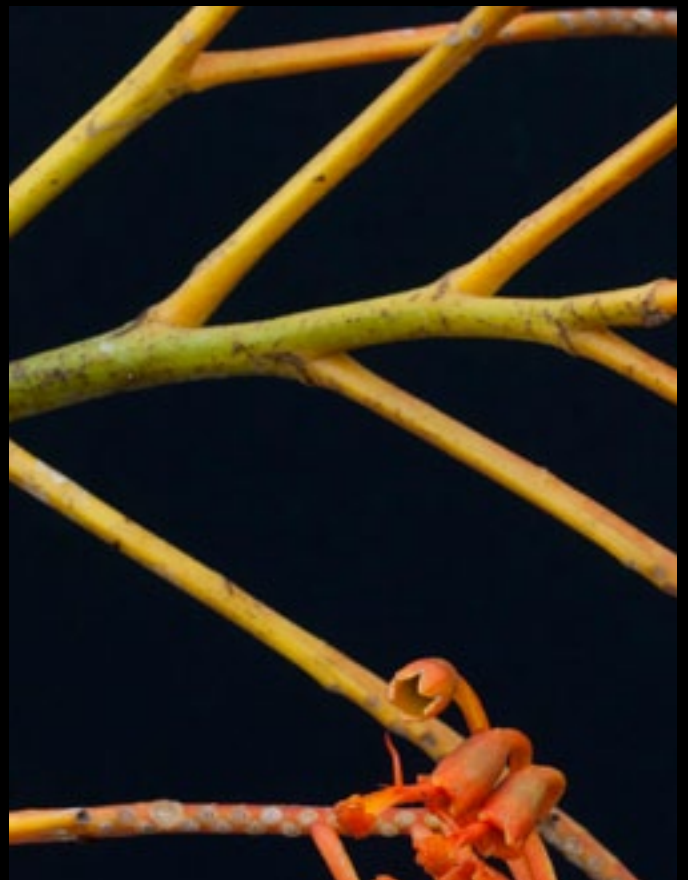
We visited this tree on two occasions, on first week of April and again a few weeks later.

The flowering was waning on the last visit. Keep in mind that flowering season varies each year depending on local temperature, local sun vs cloud cover, and rainfall that year.

The mapola trees at Tikal were blooming the same first week as the tree at El Chal, El Peten. We have separate publications on the flowers in the Tikal National Park.

The difference between the two trees near El Chal, and the dozen trees at Tikal, is that only one single tree at Tikal has branches low enough that you can reach them. All the other trees at Tikal are so high that you need a 400mm lens even to get a view.





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
